INTERNET TIPS

THE ETIQUETTE OF BLIND CARBON COPIES

Sending E-Mail to hundreds of contacts via Gmail is easy-just paste the list of addresses in to the message’s To: field and click *Send*, right? Sure, but put on your flame-retardant reading glasses. Though your e-mail recipients may have given you their addresses, that don’t mean they want them shared with everyone. Good manners dictates putting one address in the To: field (your own will do fine) and the rest in the Bcc: field. (Some e-mail programs and services may require an additional step to activate this field.) E-mail servers strip the Bcc: addresses out before forwarding the message, protecting recipients’ privacy.

SPAM HEADACHES

Use throwaway e-mail addresses for Web forms, mailing lists, and online purchases. Most ISP (Internet Service Providers) gives you an unlimited number of Anonymous Email Addresses. Once I set up a disposable address, I use it until it picks up spam. The free Mailexpire.com service similarly forwards messages from a disposable address to your real e-mail account. Or sign up for a Gmail account to share with people outside your circle. CHECKING the AVERAGES – If your research in the pioneering period (before 1850) has “dead ended”, it’s time for creative thinking. You may find these trends helpful in analyzing your problems.

***There are approximately three generations per century.

***The average age for men to marry was 24. They rarely married before 20.

***The average age for women to marry was 20. They rarely married before 16.

***First marriages were usually between couples near the same age.

***Women generally outlived their husbands, but old widowers married younger women who had never been married before. (Remember those old Revolutionary War Veterans.)

***Births generally occurred at two-year intervals. Frequently the first child was born a year after the marriage. As the woman aged, the interval between births grew slightly. Child bearing generally ended around 45.

***Families and neighbors migrated together from their old homes. Women rarely traveled alone.

***Men usually married women from their neighborhood, but if a seemingly “strange” woman turned up, check the man’s former home. Often men returned to their prior residence to find a wife.

***If you can’t find an old parent, chances are he “went west” with a son (or daughter).

***If you have a male ancestor born ca 1840, strongly consider Civil War service.

***Studies show after 1850, Ohio pioneers frequently moved to counties in other states on the same latitude as their homes in Ohio.

***If your ancestor has a virtue name (e.g. Patience, Silence), consider a New England heritage.

***Children were often named for grandparents, both male and female.

***Frequently a middle name or even a first name was the mother’s or grandmother’s

EXPRESSION OF LEWIS COUNTY

For the *Oregon Spectator*

DVD-RW and CD-RW

Which ones do I use when saving my genealogical data and pictures?

DVD's are not only for video and music storage, they are an **excellent large disc for saving data and photos!** Here's some helpful information broke down in the simplest form.
 *****RW** stands for **rewritable** (these CD's and DVD's are reusable by erasing all the data saved and starting over).

*****R** stand for **writable** CD's and DVD's (they can only be saved once, until full of data and pictures – please note – you can save over the same document when updating new information).

*****DVD capacity is 4 times the amount** of CD-R's and CD-RW's. This makes DVD's a **recommended** choice for holding more information and photos. *Teresa Jordan*


How to Make Your Own Ahnentafel - And what is it?

An ahnentafel is a skeleton pedigree, which shows the same information as a pedigree chart, but in much less space. Literally, the term is derived from two German words, “ahnen”, which means ancestors, and “tafel” meaning table. So, ahnentafel is simply a table of ancestors. It is especially useful in correspondence about your family. The system may appear forbidding at first, but once understood it is really simple. To make your own ahnentafel, number yourself one, your father is twice your number, or two. Each wife is always one number higher than her husband. Thus all males are even numbers and females are odd numbers. Here’s what you will have for four generations of your ancestors.

1. Your name
2. Your father
3. Your mother
4. Your father’s father
5. Your father’s mother
6. Your mother’s father
7. Your mother’s mother
8. Your father’s father’s father
9. Your father’s father’s mother
10. Your father’s mother’s father
11. Your father’s father’s mother
12. You mother’s father’s father
13. Your mother’s father’s mother
14. Your mother’s mothers father
15. Your mother’s mother’s mother

You can go on from here with the same pattern. Remember, each person’s father is twice his own number; his mother is twice his number plus one. You can go on and

on, as well as add birth, and death dates and residence for each person. Try it, you’ll like it. It may even be useful. *Reprinted from LCGS Newsletter May/June 1997.*


