Families of Lewis County WA Book Excerpts from: The History of Lewis County Washington

DEEP ROOTS OF THE URQUHART AND ALEXANDER FAMILY

By Dixie Alexander. Published in The History of Lewis County Washington, published by the Lewis County Historical Society, First Edition, 1985.

Seven generations of the Urquhart and Alexander family have lived in Lewis County, beginning with James Urquhart and John Alexander, both of whom came from Scotland in the early 1850's. John Alexander, a single man came via the Horn, trying his luck in the California and Frazier River gold fields. He settled west of Chehalis on the river and married Margaret Urquhart, the daughter of James and Helen Muir Urquhart who had settled their family of nine boys and two girls at Napavine.

The Urquharts purchased Cutting's Homestead claim and squatters rights of Pinto, laying out the town of Napavine, building homes, a mercantile store and post office. Later when Chehalis began to thrive, they built the first store there. The Urquhart brothers began to take up donation lad claims and were elected to various county offices. While their father James served two terms in the Territorial Legislature in Olympia during the time the University of Washington was being founded in Seattle.

John Alexander, the pioneer, was also very influential in early Lewis County and Chehalis civic affairs. He was instrumental in building the first bridge across the Chehalis River at Alexander Park. His neighbor, across the river was John West, known as the Father of Chehalis. In 1873, with others they built the first building in Chehalis, a warehouse near the railroad tracks and managed to have trains stop in Chehalis rather than Newaukum as originally planned.

John and Margaret Alexander had three sons, James T., Andrew U. and John W., and a daughter Mary who died in childhood. James T. and John W. were farmers and business men taking over the Security State Bank in 1903. Their descendants still reside on the original family farm home where John, the pioneer, homesteaded in 1858.

CAROLINE (GREUNER) ROAKE

(From the same book at the left) August 30, 1888 Caroline Greuner was born in Alameda, California. I came with my parents to Napavine, Washington at the age of one. My first years of school were at Alpha, Washington where I would walk a mile to school every day. For a short time I attended school at Forest, Wash. Later on I went to Holy Rosary Academy in Chehalis where I graduated from the eighth grade. In high school, I went to St. Dominic Academy in Everett and then to the North Pacific College of Pharmacy in Portland. After graduation I accepted a position with Stahl Drug Company in Centralia, Wash, Later on I worked for Garrison's Drug in Centralia, Chehalis Pharmacy and Marrs Drug in Chehalis, and Goodfellow Drug in Castle Rock, Washington. I have been an active member of St. Joseph Church, St. Agnes Circle, and the Soroptimist International.

April 29, 1967, I married Sam Roake who was from Castle Rock, Wash, and who was a florist. We were married at St. Joseph Catholic Church, Chehalis, Wash. Sam passed away in 1972. . .

My parents Caroline Lisec and Joseph Greuner were married February 26, 1881 in Srbec, Bohemia, Czechoslavkia and came to the United States in 1886 and then settled in Alameda, California. In 1889 we came to Napavine and my father had business partnership known as Fusick, Greuner and Linhart, conducting a general merchandise store. A year later he moved to Alpha and he had a General Merchandise Business and, also, he was Alpha's first postmaster from 1890 to 1897. My father could not speak English wile in Alpha, Wash., but he learned the language of his adopted country and became an active citizen. In 1898 my father, mother, and I moved to Forest where they build the Greuner Store, and conducted the post office until his retirement in 1929. My mother died in 1931, and my father in 1936. I also had a brother Joseph Greuner, Jr. who passed away at Alpha, Washington.

Until 1935 a well established post office was maintained at Forest, 7 miles south of Chehalis on Hwy. 99, now the location of Trodahl's Grocery Store. The post office was established by W. R. Monroe and for many years of the life of that office, Joseph Greuner was the postmaster there. After Joseph Greuner had the store, it was Ed Deggeller

and then Trodahl's. The patrons that like there now are served by motor routes out of Chehalis

We had plank roads all the way into town and all was woods from Newaukum River up to Forest.


